About the survey

- Conducted pre-pandemic, March 29-April 14, 2019
- 1,811 teen-parent pairs
- Includes teens and parents from all religious backgrounds, but only 4 traditions can be analyzed separately due to sample size
- Margin of error for teens: +/- 3.1 percentage points
 Margin of error for parents: +/- 3.1 percentage points

Most parents and teens share a religious identity



One-third of teens surveyed are religious 'nones'


% of U.S. teens who identify as ...

Half of teens say they hold all the same religious beliefs as their parent ...


% of U.S. teens who say they have ____ religious beliefs as their parent





% of U.S. teens/parents of teens who say religion is ____ in their lives




Parents and teens assess each other on importance of religion



Teens less religious than their parents by some measures, but not worship attendance




Consider religion very important in their lives

Believe in God with absolute certainty




Less-religious parents very likely to have teens who also are less religious

Most teens attend religious services with at least one parent




Teens evenly split on why they attend religious services

% of U.S. teens who say they attend religious services ...




About half of U.S. teens at least sometimes say grace before meals with their family

% of U.S. teens who often or sometimes ____ with their family




Evangelical teens stand out on religious beliefs and practices

% of U.S. teens who say ...




Evangelical parents more likely than others to say it is very important to raise their child in their religion

% of religiously affiliated parents of teens who say it is very important that teen ...




Teens with Republican parents are more religiously engaged by some measures

Plurality of teens, parents say there may be truth in many religions


% of U.S. teens and their parents who say ...

Most teens say it is not necessary to believe in God to be moral


% of U.S. teens and their parents who say ...
